Important diplomatic activity is usually sealed with a banquet. A festive meal together or a joyous picnic is a symbol of human togetherness in love and happiness. What a salesman does when he stops on the road to eat lunch is entirely different from participating in a thanksgiving banquet. Parties, eating and drinking together, play an important role in our society and signify beautiful values. In Biblical times it was the same. Hence the Bible repeatedly evokes the banquet symbol to describe God's love and human kind's relationship of love with him. The writers of the Bible were fully aware that human beings do not have the concepts and terminology to describe adequately who God is and what he does to us by adopting us his children, or how all of this will be fully accomplished in the hereafter. So they utilized the banquet symbol as an apt sign to indicate the lines along which we should think when we meditate on God and what he has in store for those who love him.

Food for the hungry - Scripture note

In the miracle of the loaves and fishes, we cannot get back to what actually happened. But we can see what it meant to Matthew and his readers. For them the miracle recalled the Old Testament story of manna in the desert. Jesus is the new Moses who feeds his people in the desert. In this feeding they saw an anticipation of the Eucharist. The gestures and words used are those of the Last Supper, and of the Eucharist: "He took the bread... blessed it... broke it... and gave it to them." The Eucharist in turn anticipates the final banquet of the Kingdom.

Reflection - Feeding the hungry.

The multiplication of the loaves happens in our fields ever year between sowing and harvest time. Like the miracle of Jesus, this miracle too is brought about by the power of God. And just as Jesus needed the hands of the apostles to distribute the bread to the people, so God now needs human hands to make this abundance available to the hungry. In some countries today the problem is overeating. In other countries the problem is getting anything to eat at all. Today we don`t need anyone to multiply the loaves for us. the food is there.
